He moved to become Registrar at the University of Birmingham in 2004 and then Cambridge in 2007. He also held roles at the Open University, Shakespeare Martineau and FutureLearn. 	<p><b>a) New Vice-Provost and Chair of the Faculty of Arts</b></p> <p>The Chair extended congratulations to Professor Rachel Moseley who would take up the role of Vice-Provost and Chair of the Faculty of Arts, when Professor Penny Roberts stepped down during the Summer 2022.</p> <p><b>b) Additional Institutional Updates</b></p> <p>The Chair reported that a number of senior colleagues would be moving on over the coming months: Rupert Lawrie, Commercial Director, Tony Pauley, Chief Information and Digital Officer and Sharon Tuersley, Secretary to Council. Dr Catherine Cochrane, Director of RIS, had also been appointed as Director of Research Strategy &amp; Services at the University of Birmingham.</p> <p><b>c) University Librarian</b></p> <p>The Chair expressed sincere thanks on behalf of the University and the Senate to Robin Green, University Librarian, who was attending Senate for the last time before retiring in May 2022.</p> <p>Robin first joined the University in 1985 and over the years progressed through a number of roles within the Library including Development Officer, Head of Information Services and Head of the Research &amp; Innovation Unit. In 2005 Robin left Warwick to take up the post of Executive Director for the Consortium of Research Libraries (now Research Libraries UK) before returning to Warwick in 2007 as Deputy Librarian, subsequently being appointed to the post of Librarian in 2013.</p> <p>Robin’s commitment to the Library, its services and it’s support to students was noted.</p> <p>Away from Warwick, in recent years Robin had been Chair of Research Libraries UK, a Delegate to the Global Council for the OCLC Cooperative and Chair of the OCLC’s Europe, Middle East and Africa Regional Council (EMEARC), a member of the Collaboration Strategy Group of SCONUL (the national organisation for academic libraries) and the UK Research Reserve and EThOS (British Library UK e-theses service) Advisory Boards.</p> <p><b>d) Students’ Union Election Results</b></p> <p>The Senate noted the results of the 2022 Warwick SU Spring Elections as follows:</p> <p>President: Will Brewer</p> <p>Education Officer: Chih-Hsiang Lo</p> <p>Democracy and Development Officer: Jack Sperry</p> <p>Postgraduate Officer: Hamza Rehman</p> <p>Societies Officer: Anna Taylor</p> <p>Sports Officer: Emma Birch</p> <p>Welfare &amp; Campaigns Officer: Tomi Amole</p> <p><b>e) Shape of the Academic Year</b></p> <p>The Provost reported that work was ongoing as requested at the last meeting of the Senate, including options appraisals and consultation with various other institutions. The need for change remained strong, however given the complexity of the work and the large project pipeline, this would be brought back to a future meeting of Senate. Thanks were extended to the Project Team for the quality of their work.</p>

071	<p><b>Strategic Research Update</b></p> <p><b>Note:</b> This item was taken alongside 077.</p> <p>The Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Research) presented the report (071-S160322, Protected), with updates under the following heading:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>PVC-R departmental visits. A Research Operations Group was being established to align the professional support for research. There would be representation from each faculty and the Group would consult with the wider University community.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Research Culture. The Enhancing Research Culture Fund had been put in place and would culminate in an internal Warwick Research Culture Conference to showcase and celebrate project outcomes, share best practice, and provide ideas for future initiatives.</li> </ul> <p>It was noted that a real transformation of research culture would need to focus on more than funding, taking into consideration other barriers such as workload capacity to work on projects and submit bids. This would be taken forward as part of initiatives such as the Research Culture Forum.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Research Communications - REF2021 and beyond. A reinvigorated programme of research communications was being developed and would include communications on the REF results early on.</li> <li>• Export Control.</li> </ul>
072	<p><b>Innovation Update</b></p> <p><b>Note:</b> This item was taken after 073.</p> <p>The Chief Innovation Officer presented the report (072-S160322, Protected) and accompanying presentation outlining progress towards the University’s strategic objectives in Innovation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Research transfer</li> <li>• Student Enterprise</li> <li>• University reputation</li> <li>• Regional Economy: Jobs, Start-ups and scale-ups</li> <li>• New University business models</li> <li>• These strategic objectives were underpinned by a set of enablers: Innovation Places; Warwick Innovation District brand; Academic and Industry leadership; Partnership to build and grow; Investment, sponsorship and grants.</li> </ul> <p>The Senate noted that the existing diverse set of Innovation programmes was being built upon, supporting academics, founders, students and businesses, with particular focus on sectors where the University had existing strengths and opportunities.</p> <p>There had been positive progress during the first full year of implementation, with awareness, engagement and impact.</p>
073	<p><b>Report from Senate Reference Group for the Appointment of the University Librarian</b></p> <p><b>Note:</b> This item was taken after 071/077.</p> <p>The Provost and Chair of the Reference Group presented the report (073-S160322, Protected) setting out the recommendations to inform the Librarian recruitment process.</p> <p>It was suggested that the changing international dynamic of students and understanding the provenance of knowledge could be more strongly articulated.</p> <p>The Librarian welcomed the vision as set out by the recommendations, in particular the bridging role.</p> <p><b>DECISION:</b> The Senate <b>approved</b> the recommendations to inform the Librarian recruitment process.</p>
074	<p><b>Update on Admissions 2022 Cycle</b></p> <p><b>Note:</b> This item was taken after 075.</p> <p>The Provost and Assistant Director (Head of Admissions Services) presented the report (074-S160322, Protected) providing an update on 2022 cycle admissions indicators, with the following key points:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The report was being presented to Senate later in the year following the change in the UCAS deadline to later in January.</li> </ul> <p>[Exempt information not included]</p>

	<p>Admissions data analysed by gender and ethnicity was requested in future reports, noting that ethnicity data was not made available until the end of each cycle and data would also be reviewed by the Social Inclusion Committee.</p> <p>Members highlighted the impact of the permanent move of the UCAS deadline on the timing and flow of recruitment and conversion activity through the year. Further discussion would be needed to understand impacts across the University and map through the workload implications.</p> <p>The net impact of investment in additional posts in the Admissions team in the context of the increased volume of applications was queried, with assurances given that Warwick was not currently behind on offer making compared to the sector.</p> <p>The highest ever level of applications, the positive effects of the scholarships schemes in place at Warwick and the new Faculty of Arts building, as well as the encouraging improvement in conversion rates were all acknowledged.</p>
075	<p><b>Enhancing Academic Governance and Policymaking</b></p> <p><b>Note:</b> This item was taken after 072.</p> <p>The Director of Education Policy and Quality presented the report (075-S160322, Protected) outlining proposals to refresh and improve the University's academic governance and policy making over the coming years. The following key points were highlighted:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Firstly, the report set out proposals on practical steps to transition Senate to a revised annual cycle of meetings in 2022-23. This sought to reintroduce some in-person engagement alongside online meetings; enable a better flow of business; and prioritise the Senate's time on its most meaningful business.</li> <li>• Secondly, the report suggested a light-touch refresh, to be taken during the 2022-23 academic year, to reflect on the working of the various Senate committees, both individually and together as a system.</li> <li>• The report also proposed a longer-term direction of travel towards an annual approach to approval of changes and publication of academic regulations and policy.</li> </ul> <p>The Senate welcomed the overall principles underpinning the proposals.</p> <p>Appropriate ownership for each Regulation and any proposed changes would be essential, to ensure accurate consideration at each level of Committee approval. Easy access to the current Regulations, as well as information on recent changes would also be important.</p> <p>It was anticipated that regulatory and policy changes would be discussed/approved at the March/April meeting of Senate, with a preference for these not to be brought to the proposed September meeting.</p> <p>While the positive effects of online meetings on accessibility and engagement were noted, the importance of informal face-to-face engagement, outside and in the margins of in-person meetings was also highlighted.</p> <p><b>DECISION:</b> The Senate <b>approved</b> the proposed changes to the Senate meeting cycle in 2022-23 (September (focused meeting), early November, mid-late January, March/April, late June) subject to reconsideration of the mix of in-person and online meetings.</p>

078	<p><b>Draft Principles for a Code of Practice on Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression</b></p> <p><b>Note:</b> This item was taken after 076.</p> <p>Professor Naomi Waltham-Smith (Chair of the Working Group on Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression) presented the report from the Working Group (078-S160322, Public). The report set out a series of principles by which the Group intended to be guided in its development of the Code of Practice on Academic Freedom (AF) and Freedom of Expression (FoE). Following a series of “town hall” sessions to consult on the draft Code, it was intended to present the Code to Senate for comment in July.</p> <p>It was further noted that the Code would cover AF and FoE, to distinguish their respective scopes and levels of protection. It would seek to address particular concerns about the legal challenge to AF, providing guidance without however being overly prescriptive. The Code could also be supplemented, with additional resources or training, with examples on implementation.</p> <p><b>DECISION:</b> The Senate <b>approved</b> the proposed approach to the drafting of the Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression Code.</p>
079	<p><b>Report from the Assembly meeting on 8 March 2022</b></p> <p>The Secretary to Council presented the report from the meeting of the Assembly on 8 March 2022 (079-S160322, Public) which was held to consider an interim report from the Assembly Working Party on Antisemitism and Racism (AWP). The Assembly was strongly supportive of the AWP continuing its work.</p> <p>Assembly members also had the opportunity to preview the draft principles for the Code of Practice on Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression (item 078 refers). 083	<p><b>Report from the Research Governance and Ethics Committee</b></p> <p>The report (083-S160322, Protected) was received and noted.</p>
084	<p><b>Report from the Social Inclusion Committee</b></p> <p>The report (084-S160322, Protected) was received and noted.</p>

086	<p><b>Student and Alumni Deaths</b></p> <p>The report (086-S160322, Public) was received and noted.</p>
087	<p><b>Any other business</b></p> <p><b>a) Proposed Changes to the Residential Life Team (RLT) Model</b></p> <p>Jenny Wheeler, on behalf of the Assembly representatives, reported that students and staff had raised concerns about the proposed changes to the Residential Life Team (RLT) model. In particular, the lack of adequate Equality Impact Assessment (EIA) (on both the impact for residents and RLT members) and meaningful consultation with those with protected characteristics. It was requested that proposed changes be delayed by at least one academic year to allow fuller, more meaningful consultation.</p> <p>Student members confirmed that this request aligned with concerns raised in an emergency motion to oppose all proposed changes to the RLT model passed recently by the Students' Union (SU) Student Council.</p> <p>Academic members reported that concerns had also been raised within a number of academic departments.</p> <p>The Registrar reported that 17 focus groups had been convened to discuss the proposals (three of which student-led and one conducted by the previous year's SU President); a presentation had been given to the SU with some support expressed by the SU; and 12 drop-in sessions had been held to gather views. As stated in the proposal, the EIA was not yet complete and dialogue was ongoing with the SU Disabled Students' Officer. The proposed model was comparable to those in operation at other Russell Group institutions. Furthermore, the proposed changes would provide the opportunity for international students to participate in the RLT system.</p> <p>The suggestion from the Assembly representatives that two EIAs be conducted was re-stated, to cover both students in residence who benefited from the support, and those who were in RLT roles.</p> <p>It was agreed that further engagement take place outside the meeting with the relevant officers to inform the discussion. The role of Senate in providing advice to Council on matters of student wellbeing (as per Ordinance 5) was noted. This matter would be reported from Senate to Council at its next meeting.</p> <p><b>ACTION:</b> Concerns about the proposed changes to the Residential Life Team (RLT) model to be included in the Senate report to Council.</p> <p><b>b) Policy Issues Relating to Academic Practice</b></p> <p>Professor Naomi Waltham-Smith reported that the Assembly representatives who were also on the Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression Working Group had been contacted about the handling by the University's Policy Oversight Group (POG) of policy issues relating to academic practice, and the principle of Senate involvement in policy impacting academic practice and academic freedom.</p>

	<p>The Secretary to Council (and Secretary to POG) confirmed that POG, with a remit of reviewing new policies and amendments to existing policies, included broad membership with senior academic members and students. It was expected that wide consultation on policies would always precede consideration by POG. In the case of the policy in question, this hadn't yet been presented to POG and consultation had not yet happened.</p> <p>It was agreed that further discussion on the role of Senate and POG in policy oversight and approval should take place outside the meeting.</p> <p><b>ACTION:</b> Secretary to Council and Assembly Representatives to discuss the role of Senate and POG in policy oversight and approval.</p>
