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






Comparison between Phase 1 and Phase II households (119 houses randomised) by age group and gender.




Comparison between the two phases of the self reported incidence of illness and symptoms



Percentage of children exposed to animals and ETS by phase at start of the study





Bedroom temperature (°C)





Bedroom relative humidity (%)





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
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

ECONOMIC EVALUATION

Indications are that overall there is a reduction in some health service costs but not in association with either study phase in particular

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CO² emissions



Reduced by over 2 tonnes per property per year.

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It is a positive example of partnership working in housing and health

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- Qualitative feedback from residents has been positive
- Five further studies on the relationship between housing and health care in progress
