# **Entrance** qualifications

Candidates must have a teaching qualification recognised by their territorial Ministry or Department of Education, and must normally have had not less than five years' teaching experience (three years' in the case of graduates). The course is designed for overseas teachers and educationists. Preference will be given to candidates from countries where English is the second language.

This course is normally confined to a group of students specially nominated by the British Council. It may exceptionally be possible to admit students at a fee of £90 a head.

General

The award of a Diploma or Certificate will be based on assessments of a student's work made from prescribed essays, his practical work, the results of written examinations, and his general progress during the course. Special attention will be given to the problems of primary teacher training.
