

## **Call for Papers Singapore Workshop on the World Bank**

Paper proposals are invited from doctoral students conducting research on the World Bank Group in any social science field. Applicants should be registered with a university in a PhD. program.

The workshop will be scheduled to coincide with the Annual Meetings of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund in Singapore, 19-21 September 2006.

The Singapore workshop on the World Bank is the second event following on the inaugural workshop organised by the Center for Policy Studies at the Central European University in Budapest, April 2005. These workshops provide an opportunity to meet other doctoral students working in this field, as well as to meet World Bank staff and other development studies scholars and practitioners.

### Workshop Themes:

Papers may address any aspect of activity of the World Bank Group. For example:

- Lending
- Governance
- World Bank-IMF relations
- The Millennium Development Goals
- The Poverty Reduction Strategy Papers
- World Bank organisational restructuring
- Academic/civil society outreach of the Bank
- The Comprehensive Development Framework
- Country studies of World Bank structural adjustment policies

Doctoral candidates who wish to participate in the Singapore Workshop should provide the following information:

- thesis title
- a long abstract of 1,000 words OR a draft paper
- nationality

Successful applicants will be notified in July 2006. Completed papers must be submitted by September 7<sup>th</sup> 2006.
