# **RATIONALE AND AIMS**

The AGORA Forum "MODELLING & MEASURING REGIONAL LEADERSHIP" is organised within the framework of the GR:EEN - Global Re-ordering Evolution through European Networks integrated research project. The GR:EEN project is the largest project within the European 7th Research Framework Program (FP7) funded by the European Commission in the field of Social Sciences and Humanities. The GR:EEN project brings together 16 leading universities and think tanks worldwide.

By fostering two-way interaction between an academic research and policy, the rationale for the GR:EEN AGORA forum is twofold:

- 1. To make the policy implications drawing from recent research more tangible
- 2. To provide the research community with a rapid and targeted feedback by the policy actors working in their field of academic inquiry

The GR:EEN AGORA Forum aims at improving policy making by providing policy suggestions based on an academic research and effective dialogue among a limited number of participants (academics; EU policy makers and civil society representatives) who were selected thanks to their expertise in the area of comparative regionalism and/or their participation in the previous GR:EEN research activities.



# **CORE QUESTIONS**

- How to identify and quantify emerging regional leaders?
- How to identify and quantify convergences and divergencies among regional leaders?
- How to interpret the measures signifying the BRICS' rise in global trade networks and which implications for EU policy making?
- Which challenges to existing models of security and stability following the rise of regional powers can be identified? How should the EU adapt?

### **BACKGROUND RESEARCH AND POLICY PLATFORMS**

In order to provide an academic groundwork for the GR:EEN AGORA forum on "MODELLING & MEASURING REGIONAL LEADERSHIP", around 25 academics and researchers, who are representing 12 universities from around the globe, have conducted a scientific workshop with parallel sessions on "Quantitative indicators: European Power through a Taxonomy of its Multilateral Capacities" under the academic leadership of the United Nations University - CRIS in Bruges (Belgium).

The aims of said workshop were to:

- Clarify the measurable dimensions of power in an inter-regional and global context
- Contribute to the assessment of power in international networks
- Develop a comparative set of indicators to monitor and assess European power in an inter-regional and global context

- Quantitatively assess Europe's relative position in international institutions (multilateral organisations and transnational networks)
- Discuss availability and quality of relevant data on resources invested by the EU in international organisations and networks; be they financial, political, human, regulatory or military
- Present cost-benefit analyses of EU external policies

In addition to this, doctoral and post-doctoral researchers regularly publish a series of GR:EEN working papers. The most relevant ones will also serve as background for the present AGORA forum.

- ca. 4 civil society representatives (Think Tanks and/or NGOs)
